


By nearly all measures, NC's economy improved in 2016. Even the recent increase in unemployment is not a concern. The rise in unemployed can be accounted for in the growth of those actively seeking employment. Preliminary estimates suggest that NC's labor force participation rate reached a 46-month high in December. However, the labor force and employment figures for the month, and all of 2016, are currently under review by LEAD and the Bureau of Labor Statistics, as we begin our annual process of data revisions. When new 2016 figures are released in March, monthly numbers may change, but the trend of our expanding economy will remain.

Unemployment Rate Trend















Average Real Weekly Earnings (Private Nonfarm Sector)









