What is Common Follow-up System (CFS)?

CFS is one of the largest (over 10 million unique individuals) and longest (since 1992) operating State Longitudinal Data Systems (SLDS) in the U.S.


Why CFS?

CFS provides information on the educational and employment outcomes of publicly supported educational, employment and training programs to support policy-making, program evaluation, resource allocation, and career planning.

NC TOWER

Tool for Online Workforce and Education Reporting: uses information from the Common Follow-up System

Provides aggregated information on students who attended public high school, universities and community colleges in North Carolina



Data include:

- programs, school district, gender and race, school year
- advanced higher education enrollment
- employment and wage outcome information



CFS and NC TOWER Data Limitations

Wage information includes information on individuals working in jobs covered under NC Unemployment Insurance Laws

Available employment-related data includes:


- employment status of the individual
- employer industry info (NAICS)
- wage information reflects total quarterly earnings (no hourly or weekly)
- wage information is not available for individuals who:
 - work outside of the state
 - are employed in NC but not covered by unemployment insurance (e.g., self-employed, church/religious organization employees, summer camp employees)

Employment-related information that cannot be determined includes:


- entry-on-duty date of employment for the individual
- employment type (i.e., permanent, temporary, part- or full-time)
- whether the person worked at all during the quarter
- number of hours worked for the quarter
- person's occupation




Education Pathway of 2013-2014 Public High School Seniors
