# NCEDA wraps up annual meeting

The N.C. Economic Developers Association (NCEDA) held its annual conference June 14-16 at the Sheraton in Atlantic Beach. Nearly 300 economic development professionals from around the state attended the conference, which focused on the logistics of doing business in North Carolina. Speakers included N.C. Dept. of Commerce Deputy Sec. Dale Carroll and Assistant Sec. for Tourism, Marketing and Global Branding Lynn Minges, N.C. State Ports Authority Director of Distribution Services James Yokeley, Piedmont Triad Partnership President Don Kirkman and Spirit AeroSystems N.C. Site Operations Director Rick Davis.

During the conference, the NCEDA presented a special President's Award to former Gov. Jim Hunt. The award is given to an individual who has gone "above and beyond to make a significant impact on economic development in our state."

The NCEDA also presented two "Economic Developer of the Year" awards, recognizing individuals who have made significant and measurable contributions to economic development in North Carolina. This award recognizes accomplishments in a calendar year, in this case 2009, that are significant and measurable.

Award recipients were Don Porter, from Raeford-Hoke Economic Development Commission, and Scott Millar, from the Catawba County Economic Development Commission.

# Commerce names assistant secretary for energy

N.C. Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco on June 17 announced Jennifer Bumgarner as the department's new assistant secretary for energy. Bumgarner comes to Commerce from Gov. ### N.C. discusses emergency response to the Gulf oil spill

Gov. Bev Perdue on June 15 joined officials from the N.C. Dept. of Crime Control and Public Safety, the N.C. Dept. of Environment and Natural Resources and the U.S. Coast Guard to discuss the state's ongoing preparations in the event oil from the spill in the Gulf of Mexico reaches North Carolina shores. A briefing in the Emergency Operations Center in Raleigh was held for state legislators and another session for local elected officials, local government managers and public safety officials from coastal counties.

Perdue stressed that experts, including the Coast Guard and U.S. Environment Protection Agency, believe there is only a remote chance that any oil will reach North Carolina shores. If any oil does reach North Carolina, the state is prepared. North Carolina had a plan in place to deal with an oil spill long before the situation in the Gulf, and that plan is being updated to handle the current situation. Perdue reminded participants that North Carolina beaches are clean and open for business this summer season.

"I believe North Carolina has the best emergency

"We must seize this opportunity to make the GTP a major job-creating engine for Eastern North Carolina," she said.

The governor attended the board meeting just two weeks before the planned ribbon cutting for Spirit AeroSystems, the park's first major anchor tenant and the world's largest supplier of commercial airplane assemblies and components. #### N.C. Film Office debuts online movie location resource

North Carolinians may now showcase their properties as prospective locations for a movie or TV show, thanks to a new online resource announced June 16 by the N.C. Film Office. The Web-based portal allows residents statewide to submit their residences, businesses, farms and other property for possible use by film crews.

The Film Office, along with Charlotte-based ReelScout, a national film location management company, launched the online feature on the Film Office's Web site, <u>www.ncfilm.com</u>. The system, called a location submission engine, lets residents showcase properties for use in movies, TV series and other productions.

#### Perdue announces 25 Western N.C. projects

Gov. Bev Perdue on June 17 announced that 25 projects in Western North Carolina have been recommended to receive more than \$5.7 million in funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC). The projects will help bring needed jobs and economic development to 29 counties throughout Western North Carolina.

"North Carolina and the Appalachian Regional Commission are partners in bringing jobs and economic development to communities throughout western North Carolina," said Perdue. "These projects will support business and infrastructure that will strengthen local economies."

Project proposals were reviewed by the North Carolina ARC office and project partners to ensure they were consistent with ARC's goals. The Commission will make the final management team in the country. We have proven over and over we can handle whatever emergency comes our way," said Perdue. "No matter how small the chance that oil could reach North Carolina, my goal, as always, is for us to be prepared."

### N.C. jobless rate drops to 10.3 percent

North Carolina's unemployment rate dropped for the third straight month in May to 10.3 percent, according to figures released June 18 by the N.C. Employment Security Commission. That's lower than the April rate of 10.8 percent. The government sector was responsible for creating the most jobs at 16,100. Trade, transportation and utilities also contributed 1,300 jobs.
