JDIG Award Helps Metal Works Mfg. Co. Expand in Cleveland County

Governor Pat McCrory, North Carolina Commerce Secretary John E. Skvarla, III and the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina (EDPNC) announced July 1 that Metal Works Mfg. Co. will be expanding in Cleveland County. The company plans to create 86 new jobs in Shelby within the next three years. Metal Works Mfg. Co's annual investment in new jobs for the Cleveland County workforce will be \$3.9 million by the end of 2019.

"Nothing compares to North Carolina's manufacturing workforce," said Governor McCrory. "This new company will find well qualified employees to not only make armor for specialty vehicles but also manufacture lifts and material handling equipment. I admire companies that make things in our great state."

The project was made possible in part by an award from the Job Development Investment Grant (JDIG) program, the first JDIG award since November of last year. North Carolina's ability to compete for jobs using its premier financial incentive tool has been hindered recently after strong project activity caused the program to reach its 'cap,' a predetermined limit in its ability to offer grants. With the start of the new fiscal year July 1, the program's cap limit automatically reset, with \$7.5 million available between now and December 31, 2015.

Metal Works Mfg. Co. is a newly formed wholly-owned

300 Jobs On the Way as Herbalife Expands in Forsyth County

Herbalife Ltd., a global nutrition company headquartered in Los Angeles will be expanding in Forsyth County. The company plans to create 301 new jobs in Winston-Salem by the end of 2018, in addition to the 500 jobs that will have been created by the end of 2015. It also plans to invest an additional \$3.5 million into infrastructure and development by the end of next year.

Governor Pat McCrory made the announcement at a press conference with company officials on July 2.

"Herbalife is nearly doubling its workforce and its commitment to North Carolina," said Governor McCrory. "These new jobs will be a boost to the Piedmont Triad region."

Herbalife currently employs 404 people in Forsyth County who produce a wide range of Herbalife's nutrition and weight-management products. The company plans to further expand its manufacturing operations in Winston-Salem, as well as establish a significant global corporate IT presence. The new jobs will include production staff and information technology staff. Salaries will vary by job function, but the average annual wage will be \$54,506. The average annual wage in Forsyth County is \$47,624.

"This is yet another example of the state's performance-based incentives helping a local manufacturer expand," said N.C. Secretary of Commerce John Skvarla. "We continue to grow jobs on the home-front with existing

subsidiary of Universal Mfg. Co. (UMC) headquartered in Lincoln, Nebraska. UMC acquired Ultra Machine & Fabrication Inc. and Ultra Armoring LLC, headquartered in Shelby to expand its manufacturing footprint into North Carolina.

"Metal Works will be adding a new type of manufacturing to the mix in Cleveland County," said Secretary Skvarla. "This company will make items for well known customers such as Boeing, Caterpillar and Bombardier and we are excited the business chose to grow in North Carolina."

"We are excited to become a member of the manufacturing community in Cleveland County and thank Governor McCrory and the EDPNC for their support," said Donald Dunn, President & CEO of Universal Mfg. Co. "The facility and manufacturing capability in our Shelby operation is absolutely first class. We have been very impressed with the North Carolina workforce."

Under the terms of the company's JDIG, Metal Works Mfg. Co. is eligible to receive up to twelve annual reimbursements equal to 75 percent of the state personal income tax withholdings from the eligible new jobs. Over twelve years, the JDIG could yield aggregate benefits to Metal Works Manufacturing Co. of more than \$1.3 million upon the creation of 86 jobs. In addition, more than \$235,000 in additional funds from the company's JDIG could be added to the state's Utility Fund for infrastructure improvements in economically distressed counties.

European Grocery Giant to Invest \$125 Million, Bring 200 Jobs to Alamance Co.

Lidl, one of the fastest growing retailers in Europe, will open a new regional headquarters and distribution center in Alamance County. The project will create 80 new full-time jobs and 120 hourly positions in Alamance County during the next three years. The company plans to invest more than \$125 million over the same period.

News of the expansion broke on July 1 with an announcement from Gov. Pat McCrory, N.C. Commerce Secretary John Skvarla and the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina.

The performance-based Job Development Investment Grant (JDIG) program played an important role in the project. If the company meets its job creation commitment, Herbalife can receive reimbursements from the state, funded by the new revenue derived from personal income tax with-holdings from the new jobs. Over twelve years, this reimbursement could yield aggregate benefits to Herbalife Ltd. of nearly \$3 million, but only upon the creation of the 301 jobs.

Expansion of White Oak Carpet Mills to Bring 40 New Jobs to Rutherford County

White Oak Carpet Mills, LLC, a division of CAP Carpet, Inc. based in Wichita, Kansas is expanding its operations in Rutherford County and plans to create 40 new jobs over the next three years. The company plans to invest \$4.1 million in the town of Spindale over the same period.

Gov. McCrory made the announcement on June 29.

"Some of the best carpets in the world are made right here in North Carolina by White Oak Carpet Mills," said Governor McCrory. "This expansion will nearly triple its workforce so it can produce even more with the 'made in North Carolina' label."

White Oak is headquartered at CAP's corporate facility in Wichita, and its mill is located in Spindale. It currently has 14 employees in its Spindale location.

Lidl currently operates nearly 10,000 stores in 26 countries throughout Europe. It is part of the Schwarz Group, which is the largest retailer in Europe and one of the largest in the world.

"This is clearly a good strategic decision by Lidl to put a regional headquarters and distribution center in North Carolina," said Secretary Skvarla. "By locating here, it can take advantage of our great workforce and infrastructure as it builds its presence in the United States."

National Spinning Company Bringing 50 New Jobs to Duplin County With Expansion

Governor Pat McCrory, N.C. Commerce Secretary John E. Skvarla III and the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina (EDPNC) announced June 30 that National Spinning Co., Inc. will be expanding its facilities in North Carolina and creating 50 new jobs over the next three years. The company plans to invest \$1.5 million in the town of Beulaville over the same period.

"Our traditional manufacturing industries are still a large part of the backbone of North Carolina's economy," said Governor McCrory. "Companies like National Spinning Company are important to the continued strength of those industries."

Mr. Pack continued by saying "Fortunately, Governor McCrory, Commerce Secretary Skvarla, the Economic Development Partnership of N.C., the Rural Infrastructure Authority, North Carolina Community College System, Rutherford County Economic Development, Rutherford County and the Town of Spindale helped us find the solution we were looking for, and it's right here in Spindale. This allows us to keep our current staff and will also allow us to bring on additional workers as we complete the consolidation and expansion of our facilities." said Pack.

The project was made possible in part by a performance-based grant from the One North Carolina Fund of up to \$25,000. In addition, the North Carolina Rural Infrastructure Authority has awarded Rutherford County a Building Reuse Program grant in the amount of \$300,000 to support the reuse of a building in Spindale constructed in 1973 and vacant for more than five years. White Oak will relocate its current operations to that building.
