Southern governors hold annual meeting in Asheville

The <u>Southern Governors Association</u> held its annual meeting Aug. 19-21 in Asheville. Governor Bev Perdue, chair of the SGA over the past year, hosted the meeting, which focused on innovation in the American South.

At the end of the meeting, Perdue and incoming Chair, Governor Luis Fortuño of Puerto Rico, issued a statement on regional collaboration for economic growth:

"The American South is the best region in America to do business and we must continue that momentum by increasing our commitment to foster innovation and entrepreneurship. Over the last three days, governors in the American South have learned of opportunities and challenges in medical and energy innovation, technology transfer, workforce development and developing the next generation of innovators. We will continue to collaborate as state to identify ways to make our partnerships more effective and we will work with our federal partners on solutions that make sense for our economic future. The end game is a bipartisan one, to improve our ability to create jobs and enhance our economic growth."

The N.C. Department of Commerce's Division of Workforce Development, the N.C. Employment Security Commission, and the Office of State Personnel have partnered together to establish the <u>State Employees' Career Transition Center</u> to assist state employees who have been impacted by a reduction-in-force. An open house was held on Aug. 22 to more broadly promote the services available to these former state employees.

The SECTC is located at 313 Chapanoke Road, Suite 130, in Raleigh and is open to provide transitional services to state employees who have been affected by state government downsizing. The programs and services offered address a wide array of issues associated with reduction-in-force, including state employee benefits, resume development, interviewing, networking and job search skills.

Perdue calls on U.S. Commerce secretary to help N.C. manufacturers

Governor Bev Perdue on Aug. 18 pressed Acting U.S. Commerce Secretary Rebecca Blank to help grow jobs in North Carolina by supporting North Carolina's manufacturing industry and making the state a regional hub for patents and trademarks.

Blank met with Perdue in a visit to Albaad, a leading maker of home wipes. In a private meeting with the secretary, Perdue pitched the state as a national leader in manufacturing and innovation.

"North Carolina is and will remain a state that makes things," Perdue said. "I made sure Secretary Blank understood the strength of our workers and our capacity to innovate and create."

Manufacturing remains a critically important part of North Carolina's economy. Perdue urged Blank to continue to support two federal programs that strengthen the state's manufacturers.

Siemens energy to make quick start at new Charlotte plant

Siemens Energy Inc. has finished building its 550,000-square foot gas turbine manufacturing plant in Charlotte.

Perdue announces five new Small Town Main Street communities

Governor Bev Perdue announced Aug. 17 that five North Carolina towns have been selected to participate in the <u>N.C.</u> <u>Small Town Main Street Program</u>, an initiative for small and rural towns that focuses on creating new jobs and investment by helping revitalize downtown areas. The newest participating towns are Bessemer City, Troutman, Warrenton, Lillington and Pittsboro.

"Revitalizing downtown means creating jobs by helping grow local small businesses and attracting investments. Our successful Main Street programs have proven that," Perdue said. "Main Streets are not just physically at the center of small towns across North Carolina. They are the center of economic life."

Volvo gets major grant to build 'greener' truck

Volvo has received a \$19 million grant from the federal government to help it develop a new heavy-duty truck that will improve fuel efficiency and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. <u>Volvo Trucks North America</u>'s headquarters is located in Greensboro.

The U.S. Department of Energy grant will be used by engineers working at the company's headquarters here and in Hagerstown, Md., over the next five years. The company's goal is to develop a heavy-duty truck that can move more freight but use fewer gallons of fuel.

Military installations positively impact N.C.'s economy

In North Carolina, the presence of military installations has a unique and positive impact on economic growth. Fayetteville, home to Fort Bragg, saw a 5.5 percent increase in personal income during 2010. This is the second year Fayetteville has been among the fastest growing metro areas in regards to personal income. This gain, nearly double the national average, was the biggest in North Carolina. Military earnings were a large factor in Fayetteville's recent personal income growth. Nationally, out of 366 U.S. metro areas, Fayetteville was ranked 19th. Following close behind was Jacksonville, ranked 20th nationally and home to Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune and Marine Corp Air Station New River, Read more,
