IEM headquarters now open

On Aug. 17, Gov. Bev Perdue joined U.S. Rep. David Price, IEM CEO Madhu Beriwal and N.C. Dept. of Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco in cutting the ribbon on IEM's new headquarters in Research Triangle Park. In December, IEM, an international risk management consultant, announced it would move its headquarters to North Carolina and is expected to create over 400 new jobs.

IEM's decision to move to North Carolina continues the strong growth of North Carolina's defense- related economy. Federal defense spending increased in North Carolina by 10 percent during the past year, exceeding \$4 billion in fiscal year 2009.


IEM consults federal and local governments and private clients on risk management ranging from natural disasters, to terrorist attacks, to overseas military conflicts.

North Carolina's unemployment rate dropped to 9.8 percent in July, marking the first time the rate has been in the single digits in more than a year.

Still, North Carolina's rate remains higher than the national



Perdue announces \$115M to expand broadband access

Gov. Bev Perdue on Aug. 18 announced that North Carolina has received \$115 million in five federal recovery grants to extend broadband connectivity in North Carolina. Combined with previous grants, North Carolina has received over \$255 million for broadband this year. Perdue has joined North Carolina's congressional delegation in personally advocating for North Carolina's grant applications in Washington, D.C., during the past year.

These funds will create jobs and help spur economic development through expanded access to high-speed Internet in underserved areas. These grants are part of the second round of Recovery Act funding for broadband projects from the U.S. Depts. of Commerce and Agriculture. North Carolina has already received over \$140 million in recovery broadband grants.

"Increasing broadband access will create new jobs up front and provide a boost for local economies to create even more jobs and a better quality of life in the near future," said Perdue. "These improvements are especially important in rural and underserved areas of North Carolina." <u>Read more</u>.

"Job growth across all sectors continues to be a challenge," said Lynn Holmes, chairman of the N.C. Employment Security Commission, which released the new seasonallyadjusted state rate this morning. Commerce participates in Plug in the Future conference

N.C. Dept. of Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco, Deputy Sec. Dale Carroll and N.C. Office of Urban Development Director Liz Parham joined Garner town officials, business owners and citizens for the Plug in the Future conference Aug. 10 at Garner Historic Auditorium.

Sponsored by the Garner Chamber, the half-day conference focused on the ConAgra land and facility donation and the redevelopment of Garner's historic downtown. Ken Atkins, executive director of Wake County Economic Development, moderated the two sessions. Each session ended with a question and answer segment with the audience.

ConAgra is scheduled to vacate its Garner facility by the end of 2011, leaving behind two parcels of land in a prime location near the I-40 and Hwy 70 intersection. In addition to the factory and the land, the company is donating to the town \$2.5 million for a community center and \$500,000 to market the building.

Continental Teves to hire 100 in Fletcher

With the outlook for car production up despite the recession, auto parts manufacturer Continental Teves said Aug. 17 it will hire an additional 100 people to work at the company's Fletcher plant.

"We are trying to get the word out that we are hiring," plant manager Bobby Nelon said. "As depressed as employment is in western North Carolina, we want people to know there are jobs out there."

Continental Teves' Fletcher plant employs about 330 people making brake parts. The company has hired about 40 people since announcing in July 2009 plans for a \$30 million plant expansion.

Plans now call for adding another 100 workers, at a rate of 10-15 people a month.

Rural Center to hold northeastern entrepreneurship conference

The N.C. Rural Economic Development Center will offer an intensive daylong seminar Oct. 21 in Windsor. Energizing Entrepreneurship Express (E2) is designed to help rural leaders in northeastern North Carolina promote entrepreneurship in their communities.

USA Today looks at growth in military towns

Jacksonville and Fayetteville were both mentioned in a recent *USA Today* article on economic growth in military towns. According to the article, rising pay and benefits in the armed forces have lifted many military towns into the ranks of the nation's most affluent communities. Jacksonville, home to Camp Lejeune, had the 32nd-highest income per person in 2009 among the 366 U.S. metropolitan areas, according to Bureau of Economic Analysis data. The town also had the top income per person of any North Carolina community.

Duke Energy opens Kings Mountain support facility

Officials held a groundbreaking Aug. 19 for Duke Energy's support facility, a centralized location planned for the company's generation departments.

"Essentially for our power plants," said Duke Energy spokeswoman Rita Sipe. "We are excited this project is going to be officially under way."

The 150,000-square-foot facility will serve as a corporate training center with available parking for up to 900 vehicles.
