

Governor McCrory Signs Job-Promoting Legislation That Cuts Government Red Tape

Governor Pat McCrory signed on Aug. 23 the Regulatory Reform Act (HB 74), common sense legislation that promotes job creation in North Carolina by cutting burdensome regulations and government red tape.

"For decades, Democrats have stifled small businesses and job creators with undue bureaucratic burden and red tape. We have more than 22,000 rules on the books in state government and this is unacceptable," said McCrory. "This common sense legislation cuts government red tape, axes overly burdensome regulations and puts job creation first here in North Carolina. Signing the Regulatory Reform Act into law today is another step toward making North Carolina more friendly to job creators."

This legislation empowers the McCrory Administration to review, revise and repeal outdated and burdensome regulations.

"I am especially pleased this legislation gives job creators the ability to provide a preference to veterans and spouses of disabled veterans for employment," added McCrory.

Decker Continues Rural Listening Tour in

Stable Trading Company to Create 45 Jobs in Robeson County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced on Aug. 23 that Due Process Stable Trading Company LLC will locate a new manufacturing facility in Robeson County. The company plans to create 45 new jobs and invest \$1.37 million over the next three years in Lumberton. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Ken Allen was the developer on this project.

"Manufacturers like Due Process know that my administration is committed to growing the manufacturing industry in North Carolina," said McCrory. "We must continue to support the manufacturing industry through our strategic investments in workforce development, education and infrastructure."

Due Process Stable Trading Company is focused on the luxury arena with a wholesale product line that includes intricate hand-knotted rugs, hand-tufted rugs, needlepoint pillows, art and antique reproduction furniture. In addition to the rarefied area of custom design, the company sells to high-end specialty rug and furniture stores.

"Due Process LLC's decision to locate this facility in Robeson County is a big win for the region and state," said Decker. "Our commitment to spurring economic growth continues to bring good-paying, high-skilled jobs for North Carolina families."

Salaries will vary by job function, but the average annual wage for the new jobs will be \$41,941 plus benefits. The Robeson County average annual wage is \$28,360.

"DPSTC looks forward to moving its main warehouse facility to Lumberton," said David D. Grasse, DPSTC's president. "We will be looking for qualified hard working individuals to form a new team to assist in our future growth.

The project was made possible in part by a performance-based grant from the One North Carolina Fund of up to \$40,000. The One NC Fund provides financial assistance, through local governments, to attract business projects that will stimulate economic activity and create

Scotland County

On Aug. 21, N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker spent the day visiting Scotland County, touring the county's Small Business Innovation Center in Laurinburg, Richmond Community College, St. Andrews University's Early College & Equestrian Center and Thomas Walton Manor, plus downtown Laurinburg and its city hall. Decker met with city and county officials, state legislators, local business leaders, members of the public, the board of the Scotland County Economic Development Corporation and its director, Greg Icard.

During a question-and-answer session with about 50 attendees, Decker said that she wants "to get rural North Carolina back into the eye of the storm" with regard to industrial recruitment and job creation.

Prior to delivering her remarks on rural priorities in the economic recovery, Decker was presented with a binder filled with information on "TARGET Scotland County/Laurinburg," a business recruitment initiative formed from recent joint discussions between local business, tourism and economic development officials and residents.

By taking advantage of what she called "an opening window of opportunity," Decker said that the state is set to cash in on its reputation as a historical textile center and benefit from the return of manufacturing jobs to the U.S.

With the convergence of "a lot of energy and resources" to recruit big industry to North Carolina and the increase in both labor and fuel costs overseas, areas like Scotland County with large unemployed labor pools should be in a "sweet spot," she said

LEAD Releases August N.C. Today

The N.C. Department of Commerce's Labor and Economic Analysis Division has released its <u>August issue of N.C. Today</u>:

July economic data indicate little improvement in state labor market conditions. North Carolina's smoothed seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose to 8.9 percent in July from 8.8 percent in June. This rate is 1.5 percentage points higher than the national 7.4 percent rate and is tied with Rhode Island's as the third highest state unemployment rate. The North Carolina labor force participation rate fell by 0.2 of a percentage point to 62.0 percent, 1.4 percentage points lower than the U.S. rate. North Carolina online job openings fell by 6,300 in July, according to the Conference Board. Total nonfarm employment rose by 8,200 jobs over the month and by 69,200 jobs over the year.

Nationally, real gross domestic product accelerated to an annual rate of 1.7 percent in the second quarter of 2013, up from 1.1 percent in the first quarter according to the "advance" estimate released by the Bureau of Economic Analysis. This increase primarily reflects growing business investment in structures along with a 5.4 percent upturn in goods exports including civilian aircraft and nonautomotive consumer goods. These were partly offset by slowing consumer spending growth and growing imports. The Conference Board Consumer Confidence Index, which had increased in June, fell slightly in July due to weakening in consumers' economic and job expectations. However, confidence remains well above the levels of a year ago.

Using June data, July's edition of the N.C. State University Index of Leading Indicators posted no change for the month, although it is 2.7 percent higher over the year. Positive gains in initial unemployment claims, manufacturing hours and manufacturing earnings were partly offset by a significant drop in residential building permits. This drop may have more to do with that component's volatility than with signs of a slowing of the state economy, according to Dr. Michael Walden, who developed the index.

Isothermal Textile Services Moves to Spindale

Rutherford County Economic Development recently announced that Isothermal Textiles has purchased the former Watts Regulator building located in Spindale to operate a commercial laundry to serve the health care industry. The facility houses the corporate office, production and distribution operations. Customers in the health care industry, including Rutherford Regional Healthcare Systems, will be able to have their service needs met with this new facility. Rutherford County applied for and received a \$256,000 grant from the N.C. Rural Center Building Reuse and Renovation Program to assist Isothermal Textile with renovations to the facility required to accommodate the new operation. The company's initial investment in building improvements, machinery and equipment is \$2.31 million. The operation currently employs 34 persons. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Cindy Messer was the developer on this project.

Isothermal Textile Services is a division of WTMC Inc., a company started in Gaffney, S.C. After searching the area for a suitable site, the company determined that closing the Gaffney operation and relocating the business to an existing facility in Spindale was their best option.

"This county wants business," said Isothermal Textile Services CEO Lee Rhyne. "My company had been in Gaffney, but needed to expand to a new location due to space limitations. When I approached Rutherford Regional about performing their linen and laundry service, the leadership there said they wanted to work with me - if I would agree to relocate here. They were intent on helping the local economy grow."

Other partners involved in this project include: Isothermal Planning and Development Commission, Broad River Water Authority, PSNC Energy and the Town of Spindale.

Isothermal Textile Services has hired more than 34 employees for the new facility, which began training/production in Nov. 2012. Additional hiring for Isothermal Textile Services will be handled through the <u>Division of Employment Security's</u>
<u>Forest City office</u>. Open positions will be posted as they become available.

Tourism-related businesses in Pinehurst and the surrounding regional area will have an opportunity to work with staff of the N.C. Department of Commerce's Division of Tourism, Film and Sports Development to learn about the Division's research, development and marketing services, and discuss best practices in reaching travelers, the media and increasing tourism visitation and spending. Sunrise USA locates in Ellenboro

Rutherford County Economic Development recently announced that Sunrise USA has purchased a building and will open its new manufacturing and distribution operation in Ellenboro. The company plans to completely renovate the building and to create eight new full-time positions at this location.

Sunrise USA has been importing and distributing pillows, dog beds, fleece sheets and other associated products at another North Carolina location, but that facility no longer met the company's needs nor allowed for the addition of the manufacturing line to cut, sew and fill a variety of pillows domestically. Sunrise USA sells primarily through its own websites and e-commerce venues.

"We are excited about this project and are appreciative of the support we received from Rutherford County," said Sunrise USA President Dave Fraser. "We looked at a number of other buildings in neighboring locations but the combination of real estate costs, project assistance and a great sense of community led us to Rutherford County. This location will allow us to be more competitive and to further expand our product line."

Sunrise USA has completed its first round of hiring including positions such as director of operations, warehouse manager, production line manager and three sewing positions. Additional positions to be created in the future include warehouse personnel, sample clerks and office personnel. These future positions will be posted and filled through the Division of Employment Security's Forest City office. Fraser stated that he has been very impressed with the quality of the applicants that he has interviewed and hired so far.

Rutherford County has agreed to proceed with a N.C. Rural Center grant application for Building Reuse and Restoration in the amount of almost \$40,000 with a required 5 percent local cash match to be provided by the county.
