Construction Industry Innovator Will Bring 205 **Jobs to Alamance County**

Governor Pat McCrory, N.C. Commerce Secretary John E. Skvarla, III, and the Economic Development Partnership of N.C.(EDPNC) announced August 29 that Prescient will establish a 205-job operations center in Alamance County to serve its East Coast customer base. The integrated manufacturing and design technology company will invest more than \$18.8 million at N.C. Commerce Park near Mebane.

"Once again, an innovative manufacturing leader has chosen North Carolina to take advantage of our outstanding business climate," said Governor McCrory. "I love companies that build things and I look forward to the valuable contribution Prescient will make to our state's economy and business community."

Prescient provides the architecture, engineering and construction (AEC) industry with an innovative design platform that offers a faster and more cost-effective alternative to conventional building structures. The company has numerous projects already completed in Colorado, Florida and Texas.

"North Carolina's outstanding transportation systems and trainable workforce put us on the short list for regional headquarters projects," said Secretary Skvarla. "Our strategic mid-Atlantic geography will put Prescient within convenient reach of customers across the eastern United States."

Prescient will bring design, manufacturing and other business operations to the N.C. Commerce Park, a 1,200-acre business property developed collaboratively by Alamance County with the cities of Graham and Mebane. The company plans to



Japanese Corporation Selects North Carolina, Creating 56 Jobs

Yokohama Tire Corporation will establish a Technical Development Center in North Carolina, investing nearly \$2.7 million on the Center over a period of three years and creating up to 56 jobs in the process. The target site will be the City of Concord in Cabarrus County.

Governor Pat McCrorv made the announcement today (August 30).

North Carolina's leadership in motorsports and automotive components are helping bring great jobs to North Carolina," said Governor McCrory. "Yokohama Tire Corporation's new Technical Development Center will build on skills and expertise few destinations anywhere can match."

Yokohama Tire Corporation is the North American manufacturing and marketing arm of Tokyo, Japan-based The Yokohama Rubber Co., Ltd. (YRC), a global manufacturing and sales company of premium tires. Founded in 1917, the company [Tokyo Stock Exchange: 5101] maintains a worldwide workforce of more than 22,000. Yokohama Tire Corporation's products are widely recognized for their innovation and high performance.

"The arrival of this leading global tire supplier adds another top name to North Carolina's transportation equipment sector," said N.C. Commerce Secretary Skvarla. "Yokohama's new testing and development facility will utilize top-notch engineering mindpower and our rich pool of talent in high-performance automotive components."

Yokohama's Technical Development Center will employ engineers, technicians, management staff and others. The company's annual payroll impact will add up to \$4.5 million to the local economy.

"The establishment of the Yokohama Technical Development Center in North Carolina is yet another testament to our employ designers, project managers, installers and other skilled positions. Salaries will vary by position, but the average annual compensation at Prescient's new facility will be \$46,544. Alamance County's average wage is currently \$36,346 per year.

"Developers, architects, engineers and general contractors in the multi-unit housing industry are seeing the benefits of our platform, and this facility will allow us to efficiently service our customers up and down the I-95 corridor from Maine to Miami by being closer to their markets," said **Satyen Patel, chairman and CEO of Prescient.** "The demand for our system across the Mid-Atlantic, the South and South Eastern U.S. continues to grow, and we are looking forward to a long and productive partnership."

Prescient's arrival in Alamance County will be facilitated, in part, by a Job Development Investment Grant (JDIG) approved by the state's Economic Investment Committee. Under the terms of the company's JDIG, the company is eligible to receive up to \$1,964,700 in total reimbursements.

By law, JDIG projects must result in a net revenue inflow to the state treasury over the life of the award. In the case of JDIG-supported projects in Tier 2 counties such as Alamance, 15 percent of the award is directed to the state's Industrial Development Fund - Utility Account to help finance economic infrastructure in less populated Tier 1 and Tier 2 counties. Prescient's new facility could provide as much as \$218,300 in new funds for the Utility Account.

Since Governor McCrory entered office in January of 2013, North Carolina's economy has generated more than 300,000 jobs.

N.C. Commerce and the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina worked with the North Carolina General Assembly, the North Carolina Community College System, the Alamance Chamber, the Alamance County Board of Commissioners, and the cities of Graham and Mebane to help locate the project in North Carolina.

Governor McCrory Announces More Than \$5.1 Million in Infrastructure Funding Supporting 197 New Jobs Statewide

Governor Pat McCrory announced August 18 that the North Carolina Rural Infrastructure Authority (RIA) approved 19 grant and loan requests totaling \$5,153,475. The requests include commitments to create a total of 197 new jobs.

"Quality buildings, sites and infrastructure remain fundamental for every business, and these grants and loans enable North Carolina communities to attract, grow and retain companies and jobs," said **Governor McCrory.** "RIA programs move the needle for our smaller towns and counties when opportunities for economic development arise."

Several categories of grants were used by the RIA to fulfill community requests.

From the state's Industrial Development Fund - Utility Account:

 Craven County: A \$320,000 grant to assist with industrial access to the Craven County Industrial Park.
The new access opens up development opportunities for an additional 100 acres of land at the park, which is commitment to the North American market," said Tetsuya Kuze, Vice President of Yokohama Corporation of North America. "With a Technical Center in the United States, we accelerate our ability to deliver new tire products to both the original equipment and replacement tire markets."

Kuze added, "After extensive research for the ideal location to consolidate our R&D activities, we found North Carolina to have the perfect combination of a high quality workforce and close proximity to a major international airport."

Yokohama Tire Corporation's arrival in North Carolina was facilitated in part by a performance-based grant of up to \$150,000 from the One North Carolina Fund.

In addition to North Carolina Commerce and the Economic Development Partnership of North Carolina., other key partners in the project include the North Carolina General Assembly, the North Carolina Community College System, City of Concord, Cabarrus County, and Charlotte Regional Partnership.

home to major industrial employers such as BSH Home Appliances, Craven Wood Energy and Minges Bottling Group.

Robeson County: A \$1,000,000 grant to assist in the upgrade and repair of a wastewater treatment facility serving Prestage Farms' turkey processing facility in St. Pauls. The company maintains a local workforce of 380, making it one of the county's largest private employers. The project is expected to extend the viability of the plant for another 30 years.

The RIA approved three loans under the state's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - Downtown Redevelopment Fund program and one loan under the CDBG-Economic Development program:

- Town of Hayesville (Clay County): A \$500,000 loan to support the reuse of two vacant buildings near the county's historic courthouse.
- Town of Williamston (Martin County): A \$335,000 loan to support the reuse of three vacant buildings in downtown Williamston.
- Town of Rutherfordton (Rutherford County): A \$311,000 loan to support the reuse of a vacant building constructed in 1923 and vacant for 21 years.
- Richmond County: A \$545,000 loan to support the reuse of a vacant industrial building in Rockingham by Direct Pack, Inc. Governor McCrory announced the company's choice of Richmond County for a 94-job East Coast operations hub earlier this month. The loan supports a total capital investment of \$6,245,000.

The RIA approved a total of 10 grants under the state's Building Reuse program:

- City of Goldsboro (Wayne County): A \$200,000 grant to support the reuse of a vacant building by Goldsboro Pediatric Dentistry & Orthodontics, a start-up practice that will create 20 jobs. The grant will support a total capital investment of \$1,478,000.
- Alexander County: A \$300,000 grant to support the renovation of a vacant building in Taylorsville that will facilitate a 30-job expansion at Craftmaster Furniture. The grant is part of a total capital investment of \$1,754,000.
- Mitchell County: A \$46,850 grant to support the expansion of a building in Spruce Pine to support New Buck Corporation's five-job expansion. The familyowned company manufactures wood stoves. The grant is part of a total capital investment of \$154,675.
- City of Lenoir (Caldwell County): A \$500,000 grant to support the reuse of a vacant building that will house an expansion by Exela. The pharmaceutical manufacturer will create 40 new jobs. The grant is part of a total capital investment of \$2,553,462.
- Town of Granite Falls (Caldwell County): A \$125,000 grant to support the reuse of a vacant building by 80 Acres Investments. The grant is part of a total capital investment of \$250,000 and will create ten jobs.
- City of Newton (Catawba County): A \$253,750 grant to support the reuse of a vacant building by Temprano Techvestors. The start-up company, which provides marketing and technology services, will create 21 jobs.
- Town of Scotland Neck (Halifax County): A \$25,000 grant to support the reuse of a vacant building by Café 59. The grant is part of a total capital investment of \$154,895 and will create five new jobs.

Lee County: A \$80,000 grant to support reuse of a vacant building in Sanford that will facilitate the relocation of Boston Fruit Slice & Confectionery, creating 16 jobs. The grant is part of a total capital investment of \$611,850.

- Macon County: A \$187,500 grant to support reuse of a vacant building in Franklin that will house TekTone Sounds & Signal Mfg. Governor McCrory announced the company's 70-job expansion in June. The grant is part of a total capital investment of \$554,222.
- City of Marion (McDowell County): A \$25,000 grant for reuse of a vacant building that will house Fat Boy's Burritos. The start-up eatery will create five jobs.

The RIA approved a total of three grants under the state's Economic Infrastructure program:

- City of Shelby (Cleveland County): A grant of \$250,000 for sewer service to support an expansion by Huesker, Inc. The German-based company's expansion is creating 20 new jobs. The project connects the company's expanded facilities to city sewer service. The grant supports a total capital investment of \$8,000,000.
- Harnett County: A \$125,000 grant for water service in support of a sweet potato processing operation at Dupree Farms Produce. The facility will create 25 new jobs and the grant supports a total capital investment of \$2,000,000.
- Town of Bethel (Pitt County): A \$24,375 grant to support the demolition of a former police station. The building was constructed in 1952 and is not salvageable. The project will enable the town to market the site to a private developer.

"These projects help businesses large and small succeed and grow in North Carolina" said **Commerce Secretary Skvarla.** "The results-oriented team at N.C. Commerce, working under the RIA's guidance, applies considerable creativity in partnering with communities around our state to maximize prospects for job creation."
