Charlotte to host PGA Championship

The PGA of America has selected Quail Hollow Club of Charlotte as the site of the 99th PGA Championship in August 2017, making it the third venue in North Carolina to host the Season's Final Major.Gov. Bev Perdue, N.C. Dept. of Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco and Charlotte Mayor Anthony Foxx were on hand in Charlotte Tuesday morning (Aug. 31) for the official annoucement.

"It is with great pleasure that we bring the PGA Championship back to North Carolina, and to make our first visit to Quail Hollow Club, a venue and a community that has demonstrated its skill in hosting premier golf," said PGA of America President Jim Remy. "In 2017, the PGA Championship will once again attract golf's finest players worldwide to compete at a course well respected among the best players in the game and challenge for the Wanamaker Trophy."

Golf plays an important role in North Carolina's economy, and the PGA Championship will generate a wealth of international media exposure. Golf-related tourism spending is estimated at \$507.8 million (as of 2007), and the direct, indirect and induced economic impact for the state's golf industry is totaled at \$5.3 billion (2007).

Quail Hollow Club, founded in 1959 and designed by George Cobb in 1961, received renovations by Tom Fazio in 1997 and 2003, which enabled it to continue a heritage of hosting premier events. Beginning in 1969, Quail Hollow has hosted Tour events in four of the past five decades, which includes the Kemper Open (1969-79); the World Seniors Invitational (1980-89); and the Quail Hollow Championship (formerly the Wachovia Championship), which began in 2003. Perdue, Crisco speak at SGA

Gov. Bev Perdue and N.C. Dept. of Commerce Sec. Keith Crisco attended the Southern Governors' Association annual meeting Aug. 27-30 in Birmingham, Ala. Crisco spoke at a roundtable discussion on exploring trade opportunities in targeted industries. Specifically he spoke of opportunities for partnering and trade with China in agribusiness and biotechnology.

N.C. Biotechnology Center President and CEO Norris Tolson also served as a panelist for a business session on the role of technology in the South's economic future.

Also at the conference, Perdue announced that North Carolina will host the 2011 conference in Asheville. Perdue was also selected to chair the SGA in the coming year.

Founded in 1934, the SGA is the oldest and historically the largest of the regional governors' associations. Since its inception, SGA has represented the common interests of Southern states' chief executives and provided a vehicle for promoting them. N.C. small firms get bigger slice of stimulus

Small contractors have had more opportunities in North Carolina than they have nationally, at least when it comes to reaping the benefits of the federal stimulus bill, according to data provided by the Washington, D.C.-based National Association of Small Business Contractors.

Of the \$64.9 billion in American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 funds that have been awarded through federal contracts, 19.2 percent has gone to small businesses, according to NASBC data.

In North Carolina, that percentage is more than double. Of the \$350 million in projects awarded by the federal government to North Carolina contractors, 52.8 percent has been secured by small businesses.

Site consultants learn about N.C. at Atlanta event

The classes will meet each Tuesday from 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m., beginning Sept. 28, and ending Nov. 16, at the OKUMA USA, Partners in Thinc facility in Charlotte. Raleigh-based Linux software company Red Hat announced Aug. 25 that DreamWorks Animation -- the Hollywood studio behind the Shrek franchise and a host of other animated hits -- plans to use Red Hat's cloud computing software to help produce animated films.

DreamWorks has been at the forefront of cloud computing and is "building one of the world's largest private clouds with Red Hat," Paul Cormier, president of products and Perdue urges restaurants and retailers to help support the growing wine industry by promoting local North Carolina wines throughout the month of September.

N.C. wins Race to the Top funds

Gov. Bev Perdue on Aug. 24 announced North Carolina will receive approximately \$400 million in federal Race to the Top grant money. The award will fund continued implementation of Perdue's Career and College: Ready, Set, Go! program, technology at Red Hat, said during a conference call to discuss the company's cloud computing strategy and technology. Cloud computing allows access to networks of servers over the Internet. A private cloud is for a company's internal-use only.

Steel tubing maker offering 50 jobs opens Aug. 31

Solaris Industries, an international manufacturer of steel tubing, officially opened its plant in Kings Mountain Tuesday (Aug. 31).

The company announced in February its intentions to locate to a facility on Industrial Drive, just off I-85. It will open in a 100,000-square-foot facility previously home to Tube Enterprises and Commonwealth Aluminum.

Company officials plan to hire about 50 employees over the next two years.

Rural Center announces \$5M in grants

The N.C. Rural Economic Development Center has awarded 67 grants totaling \$5.2 million to create jobs and address clean water needs throughout North Carolina. The grants will assist communities in 46 rural counties and create 375 jobs.

The center's board of directors approved the grants Aug. 25. The grants were made possible by appropriations of the N.C. General Assembly. <u>Learn more</u>.

Furniture facility, jobs coming to High Point

A Canadian company expanding to High Point will provide an injection of furniture manufacturing and office jobs, the High Point Economic Development Corp. announced Aug. 26.

NLnovalink, based in Mississauga, Ontario, Canada, bought a 5.6-acre site at the corner of Mendenhall Oaks Parkway and Heron Place with plans to build a 53,000-squarefoot manufacturing, corporate and client service center facility, according to a release from the company. Its U.S. headquarters will be housed there.

About 30 people will be hired initially, but the company plans to grow its employment base in the city to 75.

WNC community colleges win grant for green workforce training

Gov. Bev Perdue, U.S. Rep Heath Shuler, and Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) Federal Co-Chair Earl F. Gohl recently announced a \$300,000 grant to the Southwestern N.C. Planning & Economic Development Commission to assist Haywood, Southwestern and Tri-County community colleges in developing a green workforce training program. It will be matched by another \$494,000 in local funding for a total of \$794,000 to develop the training program, which will include civil engineering, sustainable technology, green weatherization and retrofitting, biofuel production, sustainable horticulture and hybrid automotive technology.
