NASCAR returns to 'The Rock'

Governor Bev Perdue and N.C. Department of Commerce Secretary Keith Crisco went to Richmond County on Sept. 7 to help announce that Rockingham Speedway will once again run a NASCAR-sanctioned event — the Camping World Truck Series.

The race, set for April 15, 2012, is expected to generate an economic impact of \$10.5 million and create more than 230 jobs. Rockingham Speedway opened in 1965 and played host to NASCAR events for more than 40 years.

"When NASCAR disappeared from"Tthe Rock" it was a big hit to the region," Perdue said. "Come April 15, 2012, that will all change.

"The stands will be filled, the trucks will be lined up, and the flags will wave at the NASCAR-sanctioned Camping World Truck Series right here at Rockingham Speedway, North Carolina."

A Camping World Truck Series event typically draws 30,000 fans, the equivalent to the population of a small city. Perdue pledged to be in that number when NASCAR returns next year.

Perdue, Crisco celebrate economic development achievements

On Sept. 7, Governor Bev Perdue and N.C. Department of Commerce Secretary Keith Crisco celebrated economic development achievements in Charlotte.

Both took part in the grand opening and ribbon cutting at Capgemini in Charlotte. In January, Perdue announced that Capgemini, a consulting and information technology company headquartered in Paris, planned to create 550 jobs over the next three years and make capital investments of \$4.2 million. Thermo Fisher Scientific adding 110 jobs in Asheville

Thermo Fisher Scientific will add 110 workers to its manufacturing plant over the next seven months to help build a new line of temperature controls for scientific equipment.

The jobs will pay an average of \$40,800 and will help lower the county's unemployment rate, which stood last month at 8 percent, said K. Ray Bailey, a Buncombe County commissioner and chairman of the Economic Development Coalition for Asheville-Buncombe County.

Corporate expansions create hundreds of jobs across N.C.

From Rockingham to Andrews, hundreds of new jobs were announced in North Carolina over the past week. Industries announcing job expansions included financial, energy, aviation, automotive, manufacturing and retail.

Among the new announcements were expansions in the energy and aviation sectors. Governor Bev Perdue made remarks at the "Splash of Lime" party hosted by Lime Energy on Sept. 7. The company recently announced it is consolidating its technology, accounting and engineering functions through its corporate headquarters move to Huntersville. The restructuring means the creation of 75 jobs over the next two years for the Charlotte area. Lime Energy helps industrial building owners and other customers reduce their energy consumption.

Also expanding its U.S. headquarters is Andritz Hydro Corporation, a leading provider of turbines, pumps, rehabilitation services and turnkey construction for the hydroelectric power industry.

In the aviation sector, TIMCO Aviation will add 50 jobs in its newly opened Wallburg manufacturing site as well as 50 jobs to its Piedmont Triad International Airport location before the end of 2011, with more job expansion expected over the next five years. Also, U.S. Airways announced on September 8 that it will be expanding its reservation center in Winston-Salem. The expansion could mean as many as 200 new jobs. Lowe's store damaged by tornado reopens

It was an image that gained national attention, and became the face of the April 16 tornado in Sanford — Lowe's Home Improvement, once a large, sturdy facility, collapsed into a twisted heap of metal and debris. Now, less than five months later, a new building stands firm at the same Horner Boulevard site where the original building was destroyed.

Lowe's hosted its grand reopening celebration Sept. 8. Hundreds of people filled the parking lot in anticipation of the doors opening again. At about 10:35 a.m., eager shoppers swarmed the store following remarks from state and local

Industrial Opportunities Inc. in Andrews will be adding 25 full-time employees to its payroll. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Cindy Messer was the developer on this project.

The plant was awarded a two-year contract to manufacture A-22 cargo bags for the U.S. military.

The cargo bags will be used to airdrop supplies and equipment to ground troops in Afghanistan. There also is the possibility of the contract being extended for a third year.
