Sequenom to create 242 jobs in RTP

Governor Bev Perdue announced Oct. 12 that Sequenom Inc., a company committed to improving healthcare through revolutionary genetic analysis solutions, plans to build a stateof-the-art molecular diagnostics clinical laboratory in Wake County. The company plans to create 242 jobs and make a capital investment of \$18.7 million in the Research Triangle Park. The N.C. Department of Commerce's <u>Vivian Powell</u> was the developer on this project.

"Creating jobs is my top priority, and Sequenom is a cuttingedge company working on the forefront of biotechnological innovation," Perdue said. "They have selected North Carolina as the place to launch the latest advancement in testing for Down Syndrome because our history of strategic investment in education and job training guarantees they have the workforce they need to succeed."

Sequenom Center for Molecular Medicine® (Sequenom CMM), a subsidiary of Sequenom, Inc., is a CAP accredited and CLIA-certified molecular diagnostics laboratory developing a broad range of diagnostics with a focus on prenatal diseases and conditions. These genetic tests provide better patient management alternatives for obstetricians, geneticists and maternal fetal medicine specialists. The MaterniT21 test, which is expected to launch in the coming months, is meant to advance prenatal screening for trisomy 21, the most common cause of Down Syndrome. The company was founded in 1994 and employs more than 280 employees. Sequenom is headquartered in San Diego, Calif.



Commerce names Williams assistant secretary for energy

N.C. Secretary of Commerce Keith Crisco has announced that Jonathan S. Williams will serve as the department's new assistant secretary for energy. Williams comes to the post following two years as chairman of the N.C. Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission.

"Jon will lead a quality team in the <u>Energy</u> <u>Division</u> as we grow jobs in the energy sector and serve energy efficiency needs throughout the state," said Crisco. "He has the critical leadership skills needed to continue the momentum we've built in establishing North Carolina as a national leader in the <u>green</u> <u>energy economy</u>."

Williams will be responsible for developing and implementing policies focused on growth and expansion of energy resources and jobs, implementing sound energy conservation strategies, developing renewable energy resources and industries, and continuing to foster the conventional energy resources in the state. Williams replaces Jennifer Bumgarner, who was recently named southeast portfolio manager for the San Francisco-based Energy Foundation. The change is effective Nov. 1. Learn more. While individual wages for the 242 jobs will vary by job function, the overall average for the new jobs will be more than \$53,721 a year, not including benefits. Obama talks jobs in Asheville, Greensboro

President Barack Obama said Oct. 17 he would offer his jobs bill to Congress in "bite-sized pieces" with the hopes of getting it passed starting next week.

He landed at the Asheville Regional Airport just before 11 a.m. to start a two-day bus tour promoting his plan to put 2 million people to work.

"I am going to get a chance to hear from folks about how they are doing," he said. "What direction do they want to take the country? I am going to be doing some talking but mostly listening. Because there doesn't seem to be a lot of listening going on in Washington these days."

The president also visited Greensboro Technical Community College and other sites in Greensboro today (Oct. 18).

RayLen, Cypress Bend take top honors at State Fair wine competition

The 12th Annual N.C. State Fair Wine Competition, held Oct. 5-6 in Raleigh, had 444 wines competing in the commercial division. RayLen Vineyards & Winery, in Mocksville, won the N.C. Winegrowers Cup (Best of Show) with its Cabernet Sauvignon. Cypress Bend Vineyards, in Wagram, took home the N.C. Muscadine Cup (Best of Muscadine) with its McNeill white muscadine wine. This marks the second cup for Cypress Bend, which has now won twice in the last three years. Childress Vineyards, in Lexington, received the most awards in the competition with 34 medals. The commercial competition was open to all North Carolina wineries, and the judges awarded 343 medals overall with 28 double gold, 26 gold, 128 silver, and 161 bronze medals. Best of Show in the amateur wine competition was awarded to Daisy King, from Pinnacle, for her Blackberry Dessert wine. N.C. set to present at Solar Power International 2011

Inmar to add 120 jobs by year end

"We have enjoyed steady, measurable growth for the last several years," says David Mounts, CEO for Inmar. "However, the expansion of our business has now accelerated to the point where we must significantly increase our workforce in order to meet growing client demand."

Inmar currently has nearly 800 employees in the Piedmont Triad with more than 4,500 employees across the United States, Mexico and Canada. included U.S. Representative Brad Miller, State Senator Neal Hunt, State Representative Marilyn Avila, and Golden LEAF President Dan Gerlach.

September Economic Overview released

North Carolina economic growth has been slow over the last few months, and the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate has risen half of one percentage point over the past three months. During this time there has been a slight decrease in the number of people working or actively looking for work in North Carolina. If this negative trend continues, it raises long-term concerns for the ability of these workers to quickly return to the workforce and become productive members of the economy. Thus, it also is concerning for the economy's overall growth (State GDP) potential. Nationally, the larger trend is economic stagnation, which may be the best characterization of North Carolina's economy as well. See the overview.

Initiative aims to make WNC the leader in clean energy

Clean energy is America's future, and Western North Carolina is at the forefront. To support these efforts, economic development, government, business and education leaders have come together to make the region a clean energy cluster.

Called the EvolveEnergy Partnership, the initiative launched on Oct. 17 at an event at Diana Wortham Theatre in downtown Asheville. The event included the results of an economic study on the clean energy industry in Western North Carolina.

Land-of-Sky Regional Council in partnership with <u>AdvantageWest</u> is leading the 31-county effort. The coalition also includes the High Country Council of Governments in Boone, Isothermal Planning and Development Commission in Rutherfordton, the Southwestern Commission in Sylva and Western Piedmont Council of Governments in Hickory. It also includes the counties of the former Northwest Piedmont Council of Governments in Winston-Salem.

A national consulting firm, AngelouEconomics, researched the clean energy industry in Western North Carolina and worked with project partners in creating a strategy for developing the clean energy cluster.

"The Western North Carolina region offers a unique mix of assets that, if properly applied, can support a highly competitive environment for clean energy businesses and enhanced economic activity," the report says. <u>Read more</u>.
