### Gildan Activewear to Create More Than 500 New Jobs in Bladen, Davie, and Rowan Counties

Governor Pat McCrory and North Carolina Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced today that Gildan Yarns, LLC, a subsidiary of Gildan Activewear Inc., will expand its existing yarn spinning manufacturing facilities in Bladen and Rowan counties and establish a new yarn spinning facility in Davie County. <u>David Spratley</u> served as the developer on the project for the N.C. Department of Commerce.

The company confirmed today that it will invest in excess of \$250 million to build a yarn spinning facility behind its Salisbury location, which is currently under construction, and another one in Mocksville, as well as to expand and renovate its Clarkton location. With these projects, Gildan expects to create more than 500 new jobs in North Carolina by the end of 2016.

"Apparel manufacturers like Gildan are further investing in North American operations and North Carolina is just the place for their company to succeed with that," said Governor McCrory. "The additional skilled manufacturing jobs that they'll create will strengthen the economy of these counties and demonstrates the strong talent pool and attractive quality of life that characterizes this region of the state."

"Gildan is a strong national brand and we're proud of the footprint they have throughout North Carolina," said Secretary Decker. "We appreciate the Gildan management team for

### Fan Manufacturer Expansion Brings 184 Jobs to Cleveland County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced on Oct. 4 that <u>Greenheck Fan Corporation</u>, a leading manufacturer of air movement and control equipment, will expand its operations in Cleveland County. The company plans to create 184 new jobs and invest \$30 million over the next five years in Shelby. The N.C. Department of Commerce's <u>Uconda Dunn</u> was the developer on this project.

Greenheck Fan Corporation is a broad spectrum manufacturer of commercial and industrial air movement and control equipment headquartered in Schofield, Wis. The company is often involved in ventilation projects aimed at increasing energy efficiency. Greenheck brand fans and ventilators, centrifugal and vane axial fans, dampers, louvers, laboratory exhaust systems, energy recovery products, indoor air handling units and coils are shipped to customers around the globe. The company will be establishing a new manufacturing operation adjacent to an existing Kings Mountain facility. Greenheck currently employs 116 people in North Carolina.

"A thorough and exhaustive site search was conducted that considered many states and counties. We concluded the best location for the new CVI [centrifugal, vane axial, and industrial fan] plant was Shelby, North Carolina, just 15 miles from our two current facilities in Kings Mountain, North Carolina," said Greenheck Sr. Vice-President of Human Resources Jon Krueger. renewing their commitment to North Carolina and know they'll find the quality workforce they need to succeed."

"Our investments in our yarn spinning operations will support our projected sales growth and further reinforce our position as a global low-cost manufacturer," stated Gildan Yarns President Chuck Ward. "The state-of-the-art product technology to be used in these facilities will continue to differentiate the product quality of Gildan branded products. The State of North Carolina provides us with a qualified textile workforce, competitive energy rates and a good transportation network, which are all central to our expansion projects."

### Governor McCrory Proclaims Oct. 4 Manufacturing Day

Governor Pat McCrory <u>proclaimed Oct. 4 "Manufacturing Day"</u> <u>in North Carolina</u>. In demonstration of support of manufacturing in North Carolina and to support <u>National</u> <u>Manufacturing Day</u>, McCrory and members of his cabinet traveled throughout the state to highlight the state's efforts to develop a skilled workforce for the manufacturing industry.

The tour also included several job announcements, bringing more than 370 new jobs and more than \$100 million in investment to North Carolina.

"North Carolina has always been a state where our workforce made things and we're proud of our manufacturing heritage," said McCrory. "It's the state's past, and it's also the state's future. The fastest way to grow our economy is to focus on advanced manufacturing and what we know best."

McCrory, along with N.C. Community College System President Dr. Scott Ralls, began the day at Cape Fear Community College where students are being trained for highly technical positions needed at nearby companies like GE Hitachi.

"Our community colleges were created to grow manufacturing in North Carolina," said Ralls. "Fifty years later, we continue to play a vital role in training the manufacturing workforce. The governor's recognition today further demonstrates the importance of community colleges in attracting and retaining The project was made possible in part by a \$300,000 grant from the <u>One North Carolina</u> <u>Fund</u>. The grant, which is based on the creation of 102 jobs over three years, is contingent upon proof of job creation and receipt of a local funding match. The One NC Fund provides financial assistance, through local governments, to attract business projects that will stimulate economic activity and create new jobs in the state. Companies receive no money up front and must meet job creation and investment performance standards to qualify for grant funds.

#### Ceramics Manufacturer to Expand in Iredell County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced on Oct. 4 that <u>NGK Ceramics USA</u> will expand its operations in Iredell County. The company plans to create 18 new jobs and invest more than \$22 million in Mooresville.

NGK Ceramics USA Inc. is a subsidiary of NGK Insulators, Ltd. of Nagoya, Japan. NGK Ceramics USA manufactures automotive ceramic substrates used globally in gasoline and diesel catalytic converters and directly supports and supplies all major automobile manufacturers, and heavy-duty diesel manufacturers, with high-performance components for emission control systems. The company currently employs more than 600 people at its Mooresville facility.

This newest addition comes on the heels of the company's \$93 million expansion announced in 2011, which is currently in the final stages of completion. Over the past 10 years, NGK's total investment in its Mooresville site has exceeded \$200 million. NGK's employee base has grown from 278 to 613 workers during this period.

"Our latest expansion enlarges the footprint of our powder preparation facility, and is scheduled to occur over the course of the next year," said NGK Ceramics USA Senior Vice President Steve Dailey. "Increasing our capacity in Mooresville allows our team to efficiently increase the volume of materials we export to our NGK plants in Indonesia, Mexico, Poland and China."

NGK Ceramics USA is celebrating 25 years of manufacturing world-class products in Mooresville. The company credits a manufacturing-friendly local economic climate, rising global demand for NGK's Honeyceram ceramics products in the automotive industry, business and industry, and growing jobs in our state."

N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker was at N.C. State University with Chancellor Randy Woodson on Oct. 4 to kick off Manufacturing Day and the observance at the university. N.C. State's Industrial Extension Service, in partnership with the National Association of Manufacturers, organized numerous activities on campus and throughout the state.

"Our investment in education and job training programs is directly related to our ability to produce a highly skilled workforce," said Decker. "It's events like today's that will encourage more youngsters to consider working in advanced manufacturing. The manufacturing industry includes so many diverse and unique career opportunities and we want to share that information with students of all ages."

The Governor's Senior Advisor on Jobs and the Economy Tony Almeida toured the Meritor facility in Fletcher. Meritor is a global manufacturer of advanced automotive systems. The event, which included nearly 80 middle school students, allowed the visitors to get an up close look at careers in advanced manufacturing.

North Carolina is the fourth-largest manufacturing state with more than 440,000 employees working in that sector. In 2012, the average annual manufacturing wage in North Carolina was \$53,337, which is \$11,000 more than the state average. <u>Read</u> more.

# Nonwoven Manufacturer to Create 72 New Jobs in Davidson County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced on Oct. 4 that Custom Nonwoven Inc., a global producer of polyester staple fiber, will locate a new manufacturing facility in Davidson County. The company plans to create 72 jobs and invest more than \$12.8 million over the next three years in Thomasville. April Kappler of the N.C. Department of Commerce and Leland Gaskins of the State of North Carolina Japan Office were the developers on this project.

Custom Nonwoven is a Korean-owned company that develops and manufactures polyester nonwoven pads and rolls through a thermal bonding process. The company is bringing a new production line to Thomasville, which will manufacture fire and access to a motivated and skilled workforce as factors that have added to the success of NGK and bolstered the local economy over the past 25 years. Since its first substrate was sold, local workers have produced more than 243 million substrates that are used in vehicles around the world. Ceramic substrates are honeycomb-like structures that are used as components in catalytic converters.

NGK Ceramics USA President Tomokazu Asai stated, "The continued investment by NGK in our Mooresville facility is a testament to the confidence that our Japan-based senior leadership team has in our local employees, the Town of Mooresville, Iredell County and the State of North Carolina."

### Jacob Holm Industries to Expand in Buncombe County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced on Oct. 4 that Jacob Holm Industries, a global nonwoven manufacturing company, will expand its operations in Buncombe County. The company plans to create 66 new jobs with a minimum qualifying investment of more than \$45.9 million. The total capital investment is likely to exceed \$60 million when the final project is complete. This growth will take place over the next three years in Candler. The N.C. Department of Commerce's <u>Bill</u> <u>Payne</u> served as the developer on this project.

Jacob Holm Industries was founded in 1794, and today has its global headquarters in Basel, Switzerland. Its U.S. subsidiary, Jacob Holm Industries (America) Inc., has its operations headquartered in Candler. JHI is one of the world's leading nonwoven corporations that offer high-quality products for personal care, home care, hygiene, packaging, and industrial markets. The company currently employs 82 workers in Candler, manufacturing premium spunlaced nonwoven products.

Salaries will vary by job function, but the average annual wage for the new jobs will be \$46,258 plus benefits. The Buncombe County average annual wage is \$35,565.

"Jacob Holm Industries is pleased to announce this new technology investment at our existing operation in Candler," said Jacob Holm President Steve Landon. "Since opening our doors in Western North Carolina back in 2005, the company has been impressed with the local community, the availability of a quality workforce and the willingness of state and local officials to retardant barrier and fire retardant mattress pads for use in cushion seatings for medical, military and institutional applications. This facility will be the company's first in North Carolina.

Salaries will vary by job function, but the average annual wage for the new jobs will be \$45,875 plus benefits. The Davidson County average annual wage is \$32,339.

"We are really excited to be a member of the furniture capital of the world, partnered with the City of Thomasville and Davidson County," said Custom Nonwoven Owner JM Kim. "We will do our best to make a positive impact on the local area by creating more jobs and growing together."

The project was made possible in part by a performancebased grant from the <u>One North Carolina Fund</u> of up to \$128,000. The grant is contingent upon proof of job creation and receipt of a local funding match.

# Valve and Piping Manufacturers to Expand in Robeson County

Governor Pat McCrory and N.C. Commerce Secretary Sharon Decker announced on Oct. 4 that <u>Flo-Tite Valve Controls</u> and sister company <u>Titan Flow Control</u> will be expanding their manufacturing operations in Lumberton in Robeson County. The N.C. Department of Commerce's <u>Ken Allen</u> served as the developer on this project.

Flo-Tite plans to create as many as 25 new jobs and invest more than \$1.5 million. Titan Flow Control plans to create up to 15 new jobs and invest more than \$2 million.

Flo-Tite Valves is a manufacturer of high-quality ball valves and valve automation equipment with more than 30 years of design and manufacturing experience. The company provides products for water, sea water, chemical, utilities, pulp and support our goal of becoming the premier nonwoven manufacturer in North America. This new production line is planned to start commercial production in Q1, 2015. "

The project was made possible in part by a performance-based grant from the <u>One North</u> <u>Carolina Fund</u> of up to \$100,000. The grant is contingent upon proof of job creation and receipt of a local funding match, which will be approved in a public hearing in Candler.
