# 'Iron Man 3' to film in Wilmington

Governor Bev Perdue on Oct. 27 announced that the Marvel Studios film 'Iron Man 3,' starring Robert Downey Jr., will soon start pre-production in Wilmington. The motion picture is expected to be made in North Carolina over a 10 month period, including pre production, principal photography, and wrap, and have an estimated economic impact over \$80 million while creating 550 crew jobs and over 1,000 talent opportunities.

"My top priority is creating jobs, and this film production will mean high-quality, well-paying jobs for North Carolinians," Perdue said. "I pushed hard to get the revamped film incentive passed, with the help of a number of lawmakers, and now we see that initiative doing exactly what it was designed to do. 2011 has been North Carolina's busiest year in the film industry with productions having a direct spend of over \$200 million. "Iron Man 3" will add to this record breaking year and carry over into 2012."

State and local officials have been working with Marvel Studios for over six months on bringing the project to North Carolina. In addition to the state's 25 percent film incentive, the state's talented and trained film professionals as well as the established infrastructure - including the facility at EUE/Screen Gems Studios in Wilmington - all played key roles in landing the production. ### **EDIS** is now AccessNC

Earlier today (Nov. 1), the N.C. Department of Commerce launched AccessNC, the state's one-stop information portal for site selectors and economic developers. AccessNC, previously known as the Economic Development Intelligence System (EDIS), is the state's online resource for business decision makers offering access to the demographic, economic and property information they need when considering North Carolina business locations.

One of the most innovative elements of the AccessNC system is a new mobile app, a unique tool to access North Carolina building and site data from a wide variety of smart phones and mobile devices. The mobile app versions for Apple's iPhone and iPad platforms are available today on the iTunes App Store. Android and Blackberry versions of the mobile app will be available in the near future.

With the re-launch of the state's building and sites database, local and regional stake holders are encouraged to re-check the accuracy of the building and site data they are responsible for entering into the system. The new mobile app, along with the marketing campaign to introduce it will bring increased visibility to the buildings and sites database. Data entry procedures remain unchanged

## New award honors 9 communities for small business innovation

## Perdue announces 131 jobs with CTL Packaging USA

Governor Bev Perdue on Oct. 26 announced that CTL Packaging USA, a global manufacturer of plastic packaging products for the cosmetic, personal care, food and pharmaceutical industries, will locate its North American operations in Gaston County. The company plans to create 131 jobs over the next four years and make a \$58.5 million capital investment in Gastonia. The project was made possible in part by a state grant from the Job Development Investment Grant program. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Ron Leitch was the developer on this project.

"Creating jobs is my top priority, both attracting new companies to invest in North Carolina and helping our existing businesses grow and thrive," Perdue said. "North Carolina is consistently ranked as having among the best business

## **Kinston Chamber of Commerce** celebrates centennial

## Food processor to create 75 jobs in Montgomery County

Governor Bev Perdue on Nov. 1 announced that Aseptia Inc., a processor of fruits and vegetables, will locate a state-of-the art manufacturing facility in Montgomery County. The company, doing business as Wright Foods, plans to create 75 jobs and invest \$10.15 million during the next three years in Troy. The project was made possible in part by a \$150,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Garrett Wyckoff was the developer on this project.

"Creating jobs is my top priority, Wright Food's choice to locate this facility in Montgomery County is a testament to our excellent workforce and strong business climate," said Perdue. "It's great news when innovative technology, developed right here in North Carolina, translates into jobs for our people and investments in our communities."

Aseptia was incorporated in North Carolina in 2006 and utilizes technology licensed at North Carolina State University to produce shelf stable food products that maintain flavor, color and nutrients of fresh foods without refrigeration. The Wright Foods' facility will primarily focus on producing shelf stable retail food products for other food companies. Whenever possible, the company will try to source fruits and vegetables from local sources. Read more.

## **Cabinet company to create 136 jobs in Rutherford County**

Governor Bev Perdue on Oct. 28 announced that Gourmet Group LLC will acquire the assets of Geppetto Kitchens and expand the manufacturing capacity of the plant. Gourmet Group will continue to produce the Geppetto brand of kitchen cabinets over the next five years. The project is expected to create 136 jobs and the company expects to invest over \$2.3 million in the project over the next three years. The project was made possible in part by a \$270,000 grant from the One North Carolina Fund. The N.C. Department of Commerce's Bill Payne was the developer on this project.

Gourmet Group will undertake aggressive but measured growth of the Geppetto brand through both geographic expansion and new product development. The company will manufacture its own doors and drawer boxes internally, reducing both costs and production lead times. The location in Rutherford County was selected because of the ample labor supply and excellent community college training resources. Read more.

## **Growth at forefront of regional aerospace summit**

About 100 Eastern North Carolina industry-connected businesses and area business and community leaders pinned down some specifics to facilitate aerospace industry growth Oct. 25 at what U.S. Senator Kay Hagan termed "the inaugural North Carolina Aerospace Summit." Hagan cohosted in Havelock with N.C.'s Eastern Region, a 13-county economic development cooperative.

N.C. Deputy Sec. of Commerce Dale Carroll said, "Aerospace is a major cluster for us now. There are now more than 180 aerospace and aviation original equipment manufacturers in North Carolina employing about 9,500 employees.

"There is momentum surrounding this industry with statewide impact."

Aerospace work in Eastern North Carolina is "significant," mostly related to Fleet Readiness Center East, which has the
